

## **RCPP Tree Mortality Crisis**



#### Technical Assistance for Forest Health and EQIP Funding

The RCD is currently providing technical assistance to private nonindustrial forest landowners in the form of site visits, creation of forest management plans, and promoting participation in the NRCS EQIP funding through the RCPP (Regional Conservation Partnership Program).

The RCPP Crisis to Opportunity: Sierra Nevada Tree Mortality program makes funding available for work within the 100-foot Defensible Space. This program

recognizes that the high cost of removing hazard trees and the overwhelming need to take action on private lands can prevent necessary management from occurring. Allowing work to be performed within the defensible space on nonindustrial private forest land is a key piece of supporting the health and safety of the Central Sierra's forested communities. It is crucial to note, the high cost of tree removal and treatment near structures. While the EQIP payments cover a portion of the cost, the total removal cost per tree within the 100-foot zone may be more than \$1000 per tree.

## **Forest Health & Fire Prevention**

#### **Tulare County Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP)**

The Tulare County RCD was awarded nine projects by Cal-Fire for various types of fuel management. The "CWPP" is one of those nine...

This project will create a new, comprehensive, CWPP for all of County's wildland Tulare areas. There are at least four different CWPPs in the County, all of which are outdated. Since they were written many projects have been completed or are outdated because of mortality tree issues. The geographic area of this CWPP includes private, state, and



federal lands in eastern Tulare County, approximately east of Lake Kaweah and Springville, excluding urban and agricultural lands; and west of a line generally formed by the Kern and Little Kern Rivers and major geographic features. Elevation ranges from approximately 900 to 10,000 feet. The CWPP covers approximately 762,440 acres, 20,000 structures, and could lead to a large number of acres treated, based on our experience with the last CWPP. Through collaboration with the USFS, BLM, Cal-Fire, USFWS, CDFG, and other leaders within Tulare County the community will be informed about the goals, objectives and progress of the project. There will be field tours and at least one public meeting.

#### 2020 World Ag Expo

The 2020 World Ag Expo was on February 11th, 12th, and 13th. There were 1,442 exhibitors and over the three days there was 106,357 attendees!

Attendees came from all over the world (56 different countries) to network and learn about the newest ag equipment, services and technology.
